












#### Potentate's Message



orgive me if I don't spend much time on referring to past items, for it is the future that lies ahead and only this can be changed and it's all up to us. "Quiz" What are the ten most powerful two letter words? The answer is on page 11.

The Potentate's Ball was a great success and well attended. The Imperial Potentate was our guest of honour and both he and his Lady Wanda were appreciative of our gifts and suitably impressed by our hospitality. If you didn't attend you missed a good one.

The Spring Ceremonial was well run and we received good value for the cost. The weather was a little 'iffy' but good for marching. All in all a super weekend and the Director General Noble John Neil, along with his committees are to be congratulated on a job well done.

The Imperial Session in Tampa was great. The parade, as always, was too long, especially in light of the temperature of 95F degrees but we all made it. The legislation was all routine. The motion to bring in Candidates from the street was soundly defeated, but I don't think we've heard the last of this one.

By the time you read this, our Fall Shrine work will be well underway. We are working on our budget for 2007 which will be sent to you in the not too distant future and voted on at our Stated Meeting on November 17, 2006 at 3100 Keele Street starting at 7:30 p.m. sharp.

Just a friendly reminder Rameses Shriners, that's you, is no longer subsidizing 3100 Keele Street, better known as the Club. Quite a different story from 8 years ago when we were carrying 3100 Keele Street with red ink in excess of \$300,000 a year.

Now while I'm on the subject of money and budgets, let me appeal to your good nature and generosity. We totally support your raising of large sums of money for our hospitals and again your generous unsolicited support of our Transportation Fund and we certainly don't want you to water down the Herculean task you set for yourselves each year, but I must respectfully remind you that we also need your support at head office. Yes, I know there is an old tale of the Divan not using all of your money wisely and in the past there may have been some truth in this. However, the Club is now breaking even (as detailed above) on our expenses and considering that our membership is dropping, our income is taking a beating on all fronts. We are

definitely much more careful with your generous help and our new modus operandi is fast eliminating all waste and unnecessary expense.

It should be noted that with respect to telemarketing, the "Do Not Call" legislation will take effect in 2007 and if we follow along the lines of the United States, which already has this, it will cut our income in half. Simply put, we have, at present, four fund-raisers in our telemarketing portfolio; Circus, Fantasy, Varsity Football and the Direct Appeal. Between them, they generate for us approximately \$450,000 per year. Fourteen years ago the Circus alone brought in over one million dollars per year. The estimate for 2007 Circus income is \$250,000 and that's \$65,000 less than 2006 and it will probably be well under \$200,000 for 2008 so as you can see, we do need your help to stay solvent.

The "Do Not Call" legislation will, without any doubt whatsoever, cut our income by at least \$200,000 per year and possibly more, so we need a little help. May I suggest that when your Club or Unit makes a Fraternal donation to either the Hospital or the Transportation Fund, please consider Rameses or the Club for a slice of the pie. "NO", not the whole pie, just a slice and you determine the size of the slice. We will be grateful for your generosity regardless of the amount. The alternative is not one we wish to consider and we won't go there unless we have no other choice. Nobles, I leave this recommendation with you for consideration. Now, if you are still in doubt, please look at your past financial reports, it's all in there or better still call me or drop into the office and I'll be glad to put all the facts in front of you and as always let you make up your own mind. Nobles, it is a serious problem and we do need your help.

The new style Papyrus has come under a fair amount of criticism and let me be among the first to say that the paper quality has been drastically changed, however as outlined by our Illustrious Potentate in his message in the June issue of Papyrus, he makes it clear that the move is being made to save your hard earned money; \$25,000 almost immediately and the possibility of raising this to around \$40,000 by next year. It is however interesting to note that (even with this) we will still have a shortfall of around \$25,000 which is, of course, the cost of doing business. I just wanted you all to know that there was a reason for this dramatic change and it is not a frivolous attempt to cheapen our treasured magazine.

Nobles, be assured Rameses is in good shape with respect to membership and financial independence and my message is not intended to give the impression that we are falling apart. Nothing could be further from the truth for the present, however it's my job to keep us on top and I do see some storm clouds building for future years and I'm not about to let Rameses fall into disrepair on my watch. To be forewarned is to be forearmed. It is







These various events have not only made the people of Oakville aware of the Shrine, and the good work that we do, but also as one Shriner said, "We are also having fun!"


In June, we again held our annual BBQ at the Oakville Power Boat Club. As usual, invitations went out to other Clubs to join us, along with our own quests.

#### That healthy looking tan may affect your longevity

SUDBURY SHRINE CLUB

n Wednesday 5th July commencing at 6 pm to 9 pm at the Sudbury Shrine Convention Centre, 2565 The Kingsway, Sudbury, the Sudbury Shrine Club will be sponsoring a Skin Cancer Awareness and Prevention Clinic. There will be information booths from the Sudbury, Health Unit and the Canadian Cancer Society and Dr. Lyne Giroux M.D. (Dermatologist) will be on hand to check people who are at risk. Stop by and become informed and learn how you can protect yourself.

The peoples of the Middle Eastern, Far Eastern and Mediterranean countries and other hot climates may have known of something several millennia ago that we are now "re-discovering" - the terrible consequences that too much sun exposure can heap upon your skin. No doubt they found out the hard way and realized that by wearing veils, head covering, sombreros, beards and head to foot clothing, little or no harm came to the skin. They also modified their lifestyles somewhat. In many hot sunny climates people have a "siesta" - something the Spanish/Mexican people are famous for as they stop everything during the midday heat. In some countries the religious practice of noon hour prayers is a sure fire way of getting people in out of the sun.

Skin cancers in our modern society were mostly observed in those workers who spent many hours in sun exposure. Outside workers at one time were the most "at risk" fraction of the population. Before air-conditioning in transport trucks, truck drivers would get skin cancer on their left arms - anyone who has driven in the summer with



the driver's window open quickly realizes that they have more than a wind burn. The combination of greater leisure time, longer vacations (especially when taken in hotter climates), global warming and the depletion of the Earth's protective ozone layer compounded by the desire to have that "healthy tanned" look has led to ever increasing incidents of skin cancer. According to Cancer Care Ontario over 30,000 skin cancers were diagnosed in the past year compared to 8,000 lung cancers.

What is "skin"? It is the body's largest organ. It preserves the inner workings and fluids of the body and shields it from the hostile world around. It serves many purposes that include helping regulate the body's temperature - a sort of heat exchanger. Severe damage and changes to this vital organ can have life-threatening consequences. Skin cancer (of which there are different types) is caused by exposure to ultraviolet rays found in the suns rays as well as tanning salon tanning booths. Such exposure upsets the cell structures in such a way as to cause cancer. If left undetected and untreated such cancers can have life threatening consequences.

There is no such thing as a "safe tan", as damage from the sun's rays can occur even with minimal exposure - especially light or fair skinned people.

#### Seven Tips to Sun Protection

1 Limit sun exposure between 10

am and 4 pm and especially around midday.

2 Use wide-brimmed or legionnaire-style hats, as well as clothing to shade the skin.

3 Try to keep in the shade as much as possible.

4 Apply sunscreens liberally at least 15 to 30 minutes before going outside and reapply every 2 hours. Use an SPF of 15 or more.

5 Wear a lip balm with a SPF of at least 15 or higher to protect your lips. Also wear sunglasses that offer a rated UV protection to protect your eyes.

6 Swimmers should use waterproof or very resistant sunscreens formulated to stay on in water for up to 80 minutes.

7 Remember the "Shadow Test". If your shadow is shorter than you, its time to head inside or seek shade.

Other ways to avoid the intense midday sun are things like modified working hours. In some countries from May to September the work day commences at between 5 am and 6 am and ends at around noon. Construction workers could work more safely during the night - I wonder how many compensation claims will be filed as a result of sun exposure. Government and industry, who insist on issuing construction contracts that compel workers to be exposed to extremes of sun and heat, risk causing injuries as if they were to compel workers to work in cigarette smoke - it is time to plan our work creatively.


