Charlotte also has numerous options for those who love cars and racing. The Backing Up Classic Auto Museum and the North Carolina Auto Racing Hall





Special Notice

Please note section (c) Notice below Imperial By-Laws (IOWA)

325.11 Election Regulations

- (a) **Electioneering.** The printing, publication, circulation or distribution of resolutions, letters, telegrams, tickets, email or other devices, by a Noble, suggestion, recommending, opposing or containing the names of proposed candidates for office in the temple is prohibited.
- **(b) Violation**. For any violation of (a), the Imperial Potentate may suspend any offending Noble, and he may declare the election of the officers void and order a new election.
- (c) Notice. At least one week prior to the annual meeting or any election the temple Recorder shall mail to each member a notice thereof containing this section.

325.12 Postponed Election.

If it is impossible to hold the election as required, or if it appears to the Imperial Potentate proper, he may grant a special dispensation changing the date of the annual election.

325.13 Vacancies.

An office becomes vacant in the event an officer or Representative dies, resigns, moves and resides permanently outside jurisdiction of The Imperial Council, is suspended, is expelled, is adjudged mentally incompetent, is physically incompetent, is convicted of a felony or of any criminal offense involving moral turpitude.

325.14 Filling Vacancies in General.

- (a) **Special Election.** A special election may be held without a dispensation to fill a vacancy in elective office; and if the vacancy occurs before July 1, a special election to fill it shall be held within sixty days after it occurs, unless a special dispensation for a later election is granted by the Imperial Potentate.
- **(b) Advancement.** Any vacancy that may occur by the promotion of any officer at any special election may also be filled at that election.



Fantasy and Christmas cake sales will be our next task and we would appreciate all the help you can give us on these fundraisers as well, and hopefully you can raise a few dollars to help defray your Club and Unit fraternal expenses for we all know that heat, light, power and insurance have to be paid.

We know that there are a few Nobles who are not pleased about the recent increase in dues and for the record we are not exactly thrilled about this decision ourselves. Believe me, it was not a popular choice for the Divan either, however if you read your financial statement these last three years you would know that our income is way down and as you know from your own pay cheque, prices are going out of sight. Simply put, our costs are up and our income is way down and it's predicted to be much worse in 2012.

Circus revenue for 2011 was estimated to be \$245,000. The final figures as I write are not in but we hope to reach this target, for 2012 we are predicting a circus revenue of \$150,000 with the other fundraisers showing a similar drop. The good news is that the increase in dues will make up this difference and hopefully we will be back on track.

I also advise you that we have reduced our staff at headquarters. Charlene is no longer with us and in addition to this, the Divan is required to pay a larger portion of the personal costs ourselves. Golf and BBQ visits are being scaled down and travel expenses on many items are now a personal expense. No, we are not looking for praise or pats on the back, we just simply want to play our part in the rejuvenation of Rameses Shriners. We are also looking seriously at other means of reducing our costs and we will keep you informed on our financial status as the weeks and months move on. Red ink is not an option and we will do our part to make sure this problem disappears in the not too distant future.

We are also working on two computer related fundraisers which were brought to the table by our Illustrious Potentate and the launch on these two items will take place before year end. I rather think the Illustrious Sir will brief you on both of these fundraisers when he returns from his trip, so I'll leave it at that for now, however let me just say if we all get behind them and show solid support, there is good money to be made and it could be the turning point for Rameses. Remember the 10 most powerful two-letter words are IF IT IS TO BE, IT IS UP TO ME.

For the record, we are now officially 194 Temples (or Shrine Centres) as we are now referred. The latest one to get official recognition is from Germany and they got their charter in Denver this year. 



Membership one of the most important elements

mperial Chaplain, Rev/Noble Kinsey, recently presented a number of ideas or challenges, based on Dr. J.

Maxwell's 21 laws for Divan members and the other leaders in attendance to think about.

They are definitely transferable to the Club level. Membership is one of the two most important elements of a Club or Temple's yearly plan. Some may even say it is slightly more important than fundraising. His suggestion is that we have a three year rolling plan or calendar.

Membership requires leadership. In the three cases mentioned below, individual or small group leaders saw a need and took up the challenge. A belief was converted to a plan and the plan is being consistently executed, with the Club's approval. Scarborough Shrine Club is establishing a system where applicants are interviewed to help promote active participation in the Club. When joining, all new members are asked to join a Unit and make a commitment to participate in parades or clown events. It has just started and is a long-term project.

In the Oakville Shrine Club, all matters concerning membership goes through the Membership Chairman and his committee. Again there is a long-term strategy.

Kawartha Shrine Club and the Firefighter Unit took the initiative and developed a system similar to Oakville's. In each Club, invitation cards are available for Master Masons to attend the Club and have a complimentary dinner. This invitation is also a registration card with contact information regarding the brother. These are filed and used to make a contact list of potential candidates. The Masons are contacted over the next while to guage their interest in joining. Some subtle, friendly pressure is used.

In the three examples a need was identified by an individual or small group that took action, and is succeeding.

Let the Membership Resource Team know through email, what is working (or not) for your Club. We would like to share your stories. Remember the membership Resource Team is here to assist.

You can also become a membership leader by registering as a virtual mentor. We are still having men sign up with an interest (25 on the active list). In many cases we have to assign multiple candidates to individuals because they

are the only mentor in that area. Sometimes there are no virtual mentors and the notice is sent to the Club President in the area.


To all the many members that make it a need to be involved and make our Club one of the finest. We can, when all is said and done, say proudly, "We're proud to be an Okie in Muskokie".






Shriners Hospitals for Children:

Why They Are Special

There are 22 Shriners Hospitals for Children® in the U.S., Canada and Mexico. The renowned hospital system provides expert pediatric specialty care to children with orthopaedic conditions, burns, spinal cord injuries, and cleft lip and palate, regardless of the patients' ability to pay. Shriners Hospitals for Children has helped nearly 1 million children overcome seemingly insurmountable odds and do more than they ever thought possible.



A History of Specialty Care

The first Shriners Hospitals for Children – opened in the 1920s – were established primarily to care for children who had contracted polio. Admission to our hospitals is based solely on medical need. All children, under the age of 18, are eligible for care if there is a reasonable possibility they could benefit from the specialized services available. All services are provided regardless of a patients' ability to pay.

Shriners Hospitals for Children is dedicated to conducting innovative research to provide answers to complex medical difficulties affecting children. The organization's research efforts not only benefit our patients, they contribute to the overall body of medical knowledge.

The health care system is also proud of its role in medical education. In the past 20 years, approximately 9,500 physicians have received residency education or postgraduate fellowships at our hospitals.
