

The harbour at Kingston provided the necessary anchorage for the British Fleet to control of the entrance to Lake Ontario and the supply lines for the rest of Upper Canada.

Directly across the St.
Lawrence River is Sackets
Harbour, NY, was stationed the
American Army with superior
numbers waiting for the ice to
break, then to invade Upper Canada and
occupy Fortress Kingston.

This would have effectively cut the supply lines to all of Upper Canada ensuring the end of the war and Canada as we know it. Why was this invasion cancelled?

On March 5, 1813 The Light Company of the 104th New Brunswick Regiment walked from Saint John, N.B. to reach Quebec and secure that Fort from American attack. The temperature was twenty-seven degrees Fahrenheit below when they reached the Madawaska River at the northern end of N.B.


They continued through deep snow to River du Loup, Quebec at the St. Lawrence River. This is still 120 miles from Quebec City. As a point of interest, the St. Lawrence River valley receives more snow than any place of its kind on earth. Further to this, virtually every soldier was now suffering from frostbite, but no lives were lost.

Next, forward to Fortress Quebec, the gateway to North America, pulling their supplies on toboggans and wearing snowshoes.

This they thought was their destination after two weeks of unbelievable endurance. However, the arrival here was of short duration, as they were now ordered to proceed on to Montreal to prevent an expected American attack there.

Again, at Montreal, the threat was considered not serious as a confirmed and certain invasion of Kingston. So off you go boys for another 185 mile walk to Kingston. Fortunately the bitter cold was subsiding but with warmer weather came the melting snow, wet feet and clothing.

When they finally saw Kingston, for boys from Saint John the ships in the



Kingston Harbour were a sight to be behold, too bad the entire squadron was frozen to the bottom but they resembled Saint John Harbour and home from the distance.

This date was April 12th and the six hundred troops have now marched more than seven hundred miles in the worst conditions possible and never lost a man. These New Brunswick boys were indeed tough! Imagine travelling most of the trip to Quebec on snowshoes pulling toboggans with their supplies in unbearable cold temperatures, then with little rest on to Montreal, then Kingston, Ontario.

Now, across the river from Kingston at Sackets Harbour lies the American Army just waiting for the ice to clear then attack outnumbered Fortress Kingston. But now, with the reinforcements arriving at Kingston, they decide to select York (Toronto) for this venture instead. Kingston was saved by the Saint John 104th Regiment.

This coming June, none of us have to travel 700 miles to get to Kingston, the weather will be warm and sunny. Rain is not permitted on a Shrine Ceremonial.

Reserve early as hotels here are tops and the entertainment at Kingston will be superb. Be sure to bring your dancing shoes for Friday night.

To add to your fun, Peel Shrine Club just may have an extra Go-Cart for you to drive in the parade. We like to share, look for us on the Saturday morning in the Parade line up.

Incidentally, I come from just upriver from Saint John so if any Kingston Shriner wishes to show his gratitude and appreciation for the above sacrifice made by this New Brunswick Regiment, I could accept, on their behalf, a drink in the Hospitality Room!

Reagan makes a great recovery

wo-year old Reagan Harwood is a ball of happy energy. She loves to play with toys and has a smile for everyone she meets. Just like most toddlers she is fast moving and into everything! Unfortunately, all that energy was at work on a January afternoon, ten days before her second birthday. It took only seconds for Reagan to pull a pan of searing-hot bacon grease off of the stovetop, which caused second and third-degree burns to her face, chest and arms.

Her mother, Rhiannon, who received some burn-care education during lifeguard training in her youth, immediately removed Reagan's footie pajamas and applied water to the burns. She then called for an ambulance, which took them to the local hospital in Manchester, New Hampshire.

"When we arrived at the hospital, their top pediatrician came to examine Reagan," says Rhiannon. "He took one look and said her injuries were too severe to be properly treated at this hospital. Then he said, I have a daughter, and if this had happened to her, I'd want her to be treated at Shriners-Boston.'"

The hospital placed a phone call to Shriners Hospitals for Children-Boston and Reagan was on her way. Upon arriving at Shriners, nurses met Reagan and her mother at the ambulance and whisked them up to the 8th floor for emergency treatment. The bacon grease had caused a severe thermal burn, which melted Reagan's pajamas into the skin on her arm and removed several layers of skin. The Shriners-Boston team quickly removed all of the remaining bacon grease from Reagan's body and then began to treat her wounds.

Reagan sustained the most severe burns to her arm and the area around her eye. Before discharging her, Shriners-Boston



staff showed Reagan's parents how to properly care for her wounds—how to dress them and what to look for to ensure they were healing properly.

Almost a year after the incident, Reagan is flourishing, and is still the same bright and happy child she was before the burn occurred. The scar on her face is a mere trace of what it once was, a testament to her mother's fast-acting actions in the moments before the ambulance arrived.

Rhiannon credits the doctors and nurses at Shriners-Boston for Reagan's comprehensive treatment and the assistance and education that she and Reagan's father received during the process. She hopes that Reagan's story will help increase burn awareness and education.

"People don't ever think this will happen to them," she says.
"I watch my child like a hawk—I never thought this could happen to her. Reagan's experience proved how necessary it is to know about immediate burn treatment. Reagan had such a severe burn; we were totally in the dark about how to care for it, but the doctors and nurses took us all under their wing. We are so grateful."

Meet an international patient

hen it comes to treating children desperately in need of the life-saving or life-altering treatments offered at Shriners-Boston, we are a hospital that operates without borders. Through the hard work and dedication of Shriners-Boston staff, often in conjunction with charitable organizations that operate internationally, we work to provide state-of-the art medical care to international patients at our Boston location.

Most children who arrive at Shriners-Boston from abroad come bearing the emotional and physical scars of terrible

accidents. In our care, they have flourished, healing inside and out, smiling and laughing with Shriners-Boston staff, and looking forward to the future with a renewed sense of hope and wonder.

Ihor Lakatosh of Ukraine captured the hearts of many when the Associated Press covered his story in an article that was widely distributed in September of 2012.

Ihor came to Shriners-Boston through Doctors Collaborating to Help Children, an organization run in part by two Shriners-Boston doctors, which provides international children in need of burn treatment the opportunity to receive quality care. He arrived at Shriners-Boston to receive treatment for untreated third-degree burns sustained when he was about four years old (Ihor is currently nine). Ihor's injury caused burns and scarring on over 30 percent of his body, fusing his arm to his chest and leaving him with limited mobility due to additional scarring in his knees.

Since the time of his accident, Ihor had been unable to walk. Recorder's Message

he Club and Unit Installations are all completed including a few last minute changes and I hope you are all happy with the choices you have made.

I am writing my message on February 13th, and I am well aware that yesterday was the revised closing date for the sale of 3100 Keele Street and I have been assured by our Broker, Noble Jeff Laceby, that he will be bringing the cheque to my office this morning. Note, I have already been in touch with our Investment Portfolio Manager Marcia Wisnewski of the Scotia Private Clients Group and the minute I receive this cheque, I will have it couriered to her for further investment.

Please note that the sale price was \$6,200,000 less lawyer's fee, taxes and real estate commission which will total \$309,227.30 therefore the cheque will be \$5,890,772.70 and that added to our current portfolio of \$2,707,969 makes for a total investment portfolio of \$8,598,741.70.

Be advised that by the time you read this, the bottom line as shown above will have changed due to the market changes. Hopefully the bottom line will be moving up and not down but don't worry, I will keep you posted on a regular basis, however Nobles, please remember that our instructions to Marcia are that we only invest in relatively safe stocks and bonds and we don't take unnecessary risks with this money, consequently our profit margin is not as robust as some would want it. Don't forget, we are governed by the Trustees Act and we must at all times be prudent.

Last, but not least, I promised you that my personal actions on your behalf would be transparent and I intend to honour that promise.

We are now starting to look for our new headquarters and so far I have not looked at anything that has me excited but it's early yet and we have a big city to work on. Note, if I see a property that I think has potential and time is a factor I will write to the G.T.A. Club's and Unit secretary's advising them of the location and they can have their phone committee call your membership so that the Nobles who are interested can pay a visit to the site. If there is no rush, I will advise every one of the location and deadline date in the Papyrus for their comments and recommendation. Let me be quick to point out that I'm under no illusion that I will be able to please everyone but be assured your Divan will always act in your best interest.

Most of you are aware that for the last dozen or so years I have made up Rameses Annual Budget which is given to every one of you at the Fall Stated Meeting. I'm pleased to report that with respect to the 2012 budget, I predicted a budget surplus of \$7,650. The actual surplus is \$13,168, not a huge difference but certainly on the good side of the line. If you look at exhibit 3 in your 2012 financial statement at the bottom of the left hand page, you will see these numbers confirmed.

For the record, I know that our two Ladies groups are concerned. Bokhara Court and Daughters of the Nile will receive the same information that I pass on to the Nobles and it will either

be in the Papyrus or in the standard letter I will send to our Clubs and Units also the Lodges and Scottish Rite. It will simply be a "Dear John" letter but be assured I will not forget you.

You will note that the west side of the parking lot at 3100 Keele is in rough shape. The new owners were required to take soil samples from the property and they drilled 10 sample holes. The west side produced some contamination created by the old oil tank and this soil had to be removed. The work has been done however we are now waiting for the new soil to settle after which the new owner will patch the asphalt (I hope) in the meantime do not park close to the building on the west side as your car could sink into the soil particularly if it's wet.

Generally speaking the Shrine office activity slows down a little which gives our hard working staff a chance to get caught up with the items that get set aside during the mad rush of elections, installations etc. Nancy and I are going south for a month but I'll be back in late March with renewed energy and ambition and ready for what lies ahead.

Don't forget to support the Potentate's Ball on Saturday, April 13th. This is one of the highlights of Terry's year and a large turn out for him and Lady Joyce would be appreciated by your Divan.

On Sunday, May 26th we invite all our Special Ladies out to lunch and I know they all look forward to this very special day. This is our chance to say thank you to them for the support they and their Nobles gave to Rameses over the years. This is the time to reflect on days gone by and the Noble friends we all miss by their departure from our daily lives. 

Researchers at Shriners Hospitals for Children - Canada, discover cause of debilitating bone disease

ONTREAL, Feb. 12, 2013 - Shriners Hospitals for Children, Canada is the first, worldwide, to identify the genetic defect underlying a painful bone disease that causes an unusual series of symptoms including severe tooth decay, osteoporosis and spine fractures in teenagers.

Led by Frank Rauch, M.D., a pediatrician, and Pierre Moffatt, Ph.D., a basic scientist, at Shriners Hospitals for Children, the team discovered that a part of the RUNX2 gene was duplicated, and therefore caused a disease called metaphyseal dysplasia with maxillary hypoplasia and brachydactyly or MDMHB. They were able to link the unusual series of symptoms observed in patients to the changes in observed in the RUNX2 gene, which is essential for creating bone forming cells. In doing so, they established that these changes in the RUNX2 gene result in disordered bone cell production which is the cause of MDMHB. The discovery is published in The American Journal of

What does this disease look like?

Human Genetics this month.

MDMHB was first named and described over 30 years ago by The Montreal Children's Hospital's Fahed Halal, M.D. In 1982, he published his findings which included the physical characteristics of 12 children and their family members who all had the same unusual series of symptoms: fractures of the spinal column (without accident), very low bone density, crumbling teeth and large collarbones. Bones in the arms, legs and pelvis also looked unusually large on x-rays and sometimes scoliosis was present. The first patients to come to Shriners Hospitals for Children with this disease were seen in 1992 by pediatrician Gilles Chabot, M.D. who referred them to metabolic bone disease expert Francis Glorieux, M.D., Ph.D. The outcome of this disease for patients is a life in pain. Their teeth break easily and can be so painful that they have them removed by the age of 20. As they grow, many have breaks in their backbones, similar to elderly people with osteoporosis.

Research to find the cause of MDMHB

In 2003, Dr. Rauch saw a new teenage patient in the Metabolic Bone Clinic at Shriners Hospitals for Children. The patient complained of back pain and had the physical characteristics that matched the already-described MDMHB. He went on to examine relatives and found that 3 other teens and 2 of the adults were affected in the same way.

"We obtained x-rays, performed bone density tests and took samples for DNA analysis," says Dr. Rauch. "However, at that time the technology did not exist to identify the disease-causing gene in such a group. Two years ago, a consortium was set up for finding rare disease genes in Canada. With their support we could get the samples analyzed at the Genome Centres in Montreal and Toronto, and we detected a problem in the RUNX2 gene in all affected family members."

With genetic results in hand, Dr. Rauch asked for Dr. Moffatt's help to uncover the mystery behind MDMHB. Why was this extra piece of gene causing these physical symptoms? Dr. Moffatt found that the genetic change leads to a more active and higher amount of RUNX2 protein inside cells. Why this causes osteoporosis in teenagers is not yet clear.

Helping affected children

Currently, the bone-building treatment which was pioneered at Shriners Hospitals for Children for patients with osteogenesis imperfecta (brittle bone disease) is being used also for MDMHB patients. "It increases bone density and minimizes bone pain,"

says Dr. Rauch, "but it does not directly affect the underlying problem in this disease."

"Now that we know the cause, we can identify patients with this disease earlier. So we can address their problems earlier, such as treating children before they have

breaks in their backbones. We can also better manage the tooth problem and hopefully prevent the crumbling. Currently, many people with this disease simply have all of their teeth extracted, but by doing so, the jaw bones become thinner and thinner with time. Finding a mechanism to preserve the teeth, while minimizing pain would be a better alternative" concluded Dr. Rauch.

In order to develop tailored therapeutics MDMHB needs to be better understood.

According to Dr. Moffatt, this type of research is like being a detective. "You begin to piece together the different clues. We have found the culprit, the duplication in the RUNX2 gene, but we don't have all the details, the how and the why, we don't have the

whole story, this is only the beginning" When asked what the next steps are, he further explained that "In order to push our research further and to fully understand the mechanisms underlying the disease, we need to identify and see more patients, in other words, with more information we will be able to further validate our results and develop more targeted treatments."

Testing is available right now; if you know of a doctor who has patients presenting with these symptoms or you know of a child that has these symptoms and would like to get tested and treatment, Shriners Hospitals for Children asks that you refer to the hospital's Metabolic Bone Clinic by calling:

WHAT HAPPENS TO THE MONEY RAISED BY THE SHRINE CLUB? Compared to Shrine Clubs in the U.S. and Canada, our Club is relatively small, but very compared to Sarune Clubs in the U.S. and Canada, our Club is relatively small, but very active. Our biggest activity is helping takeside children with medical problems, either at the Shriners Hospital in Mexico City or locally at lakeside or in Guadalajara.

Here are the statistics for our Club in 2012:

Shrine Club Funds spent \$308,685.42 pesos


