

Isn't it great to be a Shriner . . . it's Feztastic!

Take care in your selection of your Oriental Guide

Then the members of the Shrine elect a Noble to the office of Oriental Guide, they are virtually starting that Noble through the Divan line on the assumption that he will prove qualified for a merit achievement to the high office of Illustrious Potentate, hence it is quite evident that the nominations for Oriental Guide should be based upon thorough and accurate evaluation of character, ability and interest.

A Noble can be a good fellow, a hard worker and a loyal Shriner ... and yet lack the basic qualifications which make a good Potentate. Unless a Noble is fully qualified for the job, he is unfair both to himself and his temple in seeking office of Oriental Guide, however no thinking man would be so naive or presumptuous as to believe that any Noble could possibly embody all the virtues, talents and qualifications which are set forth in this check list for advance evaluation of potential candidates by voting members.

- Executive ability
- Leadership
- · Financial security
- Energy and vitality
- Free to donate ample time
- Capable of building good public relations
- Good habits and moral character
- Interest in Shrinedom
- Ability to give and get co-operation
- Diplomacy

Many temples have placed a definite limitation upon their progress as a result of hasty judgement in connection with the nominations for the office of Oriental Guide. Every Noble is not fitted to meet the rigorous demands upon Potentates. So let's be fair, honest and wise in the all-important matter of electing to office only men who are eminently qualified for the job. We all know that with honour comes responsibility and while there is high honour associated with a Divan office, the ensuing responsibilities entail a lot of time-consuming, energy-consuming work. Eternal vigilance must be wisely and thoughtfully exercised by the voting membership in order to perpetuate a high calibre of leadership.

Every leadership journey has its ups and downs or the "what if" surfaces. Real leadership comes into play when the unthinkable happens. True leadership means keeping on this path and its direction.

True leadership means standing in the face of adversity. "Take care in the selection of your Oriental Guide".

Appointments are for one year only!

When a Potentate's term of office expires, all appointments made by him during his administration, terminate according to the Imperial Code. Such appointments include all Appointed Officers, Potentate's Aides, Members of Committees and their Chairmen, Special Appointees, Directors, Assistant Directors and all members of the Potentate's Staff.

Some uniformed Nobles have mistakenly believed or assumed their appointments to be permanent. Not so. Each Potentate when installed in office, must make his own appointments including six (6) Officers of his Divan, 1st & 2nd Ceremonial Masters, Director, Marshal, Captain of the Guard and Outer Guard.

The Potentate has the power and authority under Imperial Shrine Law to replace every appointee or he may, if he believes it to be in the best interest of the Shrine, retain all appointees by re-appointment. Traditionally, for the sake of efficiency, many Nobles of demonstrated ability, are continued in office or appointment by re-appointment, but this is at the will and pleasure of the incoming Potentate.

In no case is he, or can he be bound by his predecessor. By the same token, in no case can any Potentate bind his successor.

Courtesy requires that a Noble holding an appointed office, position or assignment, tender his resignation to the incoming Potentate. If it is the will and pleasure of the incoming Potentate that this Noble is to continue in his office or position by re-appointment, he will be notified by the Potentate to that effect.

Should any Noble not holding appointment by the current Potentate, wear a fez carrying any title such as "Aide" or any other designation, he does so in violation of the code.

Some Nobles seek to perpetuate any appointment fictitiously by adding to the lettering on the fez, the year or years of their appointment. This is in violation of the Imperial Law. The offenders may be uninformed, but ignorance of the law is no excuse.

In 2008 the Club became the beneficiary of a will that was from the Estate of Wilhelmina F. Winney who had passed some years before. The substantial gift was probated and the Club then considered where the proceeds would be best applied.

III. Sir Fred Clarke who at the time was the Rameses representative on the Montreal board worked with Noble Eric Welbanks and the Club to identify a project that would fit the size of the gift.

As the new Montreal Hospital project was about to be launched it was decided that the funds should be directed to this endeavour. Dr. Reggie Hamdy was invited to Kingston and

the project of a skills laboratory was selected. The Club committed to growing and supplementing the sum with a lofty goal of \$400,000 being the target.

The Club was greatly assisted by Noble John Neil the current board member, Noble Roland Morrow (Kingston) and Emmanuelle Rondeau (Montreal Hospital) in arranging the September 12th visit.

Noble Eric Welbanks made the presentation on behalf of all of the Nobles and Ladies to Dr. Reggie Hamdy, Chief of Staff, Montreal Hospital. Past President Noble Len Barrie and current President Noble Karl Prohaska carried the "Big Cheque" that stated that the Kingston District Shrine Club would donate \$401,000 to the project to now be known as the Pediatric Medical Simulation Centre. This centre is the only such unit in the entire Shriners Hospitals Network. It will provide a controlled setting where basic and complex surgical techniques can be learned and practiced before applying them to patients.

Novice orthopaedic surgeons as well as teams of healthcare professionals will have access to this laboratory to learn specialized surgical techniques.

Whatever your role or function is in your Club or Unit, please



This is also a happy place for the children with bright colours and themed areas on each floor. uring the last Imperial Session in Houston the Voting Representatives voted to increase the Per Capita from \$15 to \$30 per member. This increase will take effect before January 1st, 2016. In order to avoid this increase you may wish to become a Per Capita Life member which means you would pay off your Life Time Per Capita at the old rate of \$450.00.

Example:

Currently:

Temple dues \$100.00 + Per Capita \$15 + Hospital \$5.00 = \$120.00

After January 1 - 2016 Temple dues \$100.00 + Per Capita \$30.00 + Hospital \$5.00 = \$135.00

But if you would like to make the \$450.00 life payment before December 31, 2015, your yearly dues will be Temple dues \$100.00 + Hospital \$5.00 = \$105.00

There are other options:

Total Life Member means you paid your dues, Per Capita and Hospital off at the cost of \$2,600.00 after December 11 the cost would be \$3,050.00.

Life Member means you paid your dues off at the cost of \$2,000.00, but still owe the Per capita and Hospital. Per Capita Life Member means you paid the Hospital levy off for \$150.00.

Permanent Contributing Per Capita Member means you paid the Per Capita and Hospital off and only owe the Temple dues at \$100.00.

To pay any part of your 2016 Life Time dues off before December 31, 2015 is as follows:

Temple Dues- \$2,000.00 Per Capita - \$450.00 Hospital- \$150.00 After December 11, 2015: 2016 Temple Dues- \$2,000.00 Per Capita - \$900.00 Hospital - \$150.00

An in-depth interview with the Reverend Bevan Carrique PP

s Masons and Shriners we have created many friendships in the Blue Lodge and in our Temples and Clubs. This special bond we have as Brothers also extends to our families and loved ones. We see each other at meetings and functions. Many of us are not just Fraternal Brothers but we also have created deep family friendships with one another.

The average age of a Rameses Noble is 74 and approximately 2,297 of us are over 65 years of age. We are starting to see an increase in our Sick and Visiting. In 2013 and 2014 The Black Camel visited us 513 times.

As a reporter and a concerned Shriner/Mason, I have a number of questions about our role as Nobles in overcoming the loss of a fellow Shriner or Mason. I approached my friend, our Chaplin and Past Potentate Reverend Bevan Carrique with some questions.

Here is my interview:

Question - What are your duties as Rameses Chaplin? Reply - The duties of a Shrine Chaplain are to deliver the Blessing at all Temple functions, meetings, dinners, ceremonials etc.

The Chaplain conducts the Memorial Service at the Fall Ceremonial, the Carol Service and the Church Service at the Spring Ceremonial.

The Chaplain should be available to any Noble, their families and friends for funeral services, marriages, baptisms and any other service they may be requested to do in a time of need.

Question - Do you think Shrine/Masons have a closer alliance as compared to other organizations?

Reply - I feel that Shrine/Masons do have a closer relationship than most organizations. We are all part of a Brotherhood and have a very special bond.

Question - Would you say there are more Masons and families wanting Masonic Funerals today than in the past? Reply - Not all families know that there is a Masonic Funeral Service that is performed before the regular funeral service that is available to all brethren. We must advise our families if we wish to have a Masonic Funeral Service

Question - What is the significance of a Masonic Funeral?

Reply - It is our way of saying our goodbyes to our fellow Brothers. It can also be a comfort to the family knowing that we have come to show our respect to our fellow Brother Mason. It also gives insight to those who are not Masons to see and learn about our fellowship.

Question - What support is there for the families after a Shriner or Mason has passed?

Reply - Many of the Lodges, Shrine Clubs and Units keep in touch with the wives of a deceased Mason or Shriner. Rameses Shriners holds a "Special Ladies" Luncheon every year for the wives of our Nobles who have passed on.

Question - What support or groups are there for the Widow of a Mason or Shriner?

Reply - Although we do not have any support groups for our Widows, these Ladies are most welcome to speak with the Temple Chaplain at any time.

Question - What should the family do with a Shriner's/Mason's medals and personal regalia?

Reply - As Masons and Nobles we should let our families know what they should do with our Masonic and Shrine regalia after we are gone.

Question - Is there any more that we can do for an ailing Noble or their families?

Reply - One of the responsibilities of the Shrine Club Ambassadors is to keep in touch with an ailing Noble and his family. If a Noble does not belong to a Club, the Noble and his family can contact the Shrine Office who will then notify the Chaplain or they can notify the Chaplain directly.

Final Comment:

Bevan, thank you for your input on this important subject. I would agree that as Masons and Shriners we have a deeper sense of values and personal commitment to each other than any other organization or fraternity. I know this information will help us and I know you are available if any of us have questions or need consolement.

Dear Fellow Nobles:

Es Selamu Aleikum, brothers. General Order #1 has been published and posted to the Shriners Village site. Per tradition, it contains details of our newly elected Imperial Divan, committee appointments, dates and locations of future Imperial Sessions and legislation adopted in our 2015 Imperial Session. Beginning on page 21, General Order #1 also contains the declaration of our "Sovereignty, Rights and Responsibilities." Subsequent pages expand on these topics, and new or revised sections are noted in the margins.

Our Protocol has also been updated and as is our custom, sections of it appear in General Order #1.

This portion of the Order is designed to reduce confusion and future misunderstanding by detailing precisely which flags are permitted to be displayed according to Shrine Protocol. With this Order, it is easy for a temple to fairly apply the same rule to all flags sought to be flown by Shriners at a Shrine event now and in the future anywhere in the world.

Therefore, because General Order #1 fully addresses the issue of protocol relating to the display of flags, Special Order #4 has been superseded. Special Order #5 has just been issued which specifically rescinds Special Order #4. Special Order #4 is now null and void.

Prohibitions Shriners
International

The following section of Shiners International General Order No. 1 was updated after the flag incidents in the USA with the US Confederate flag. This item is new.

SHRINE PROTOCOL

3. Flag Prohibitions. Shriners International, as its name states, is an international fraternal organization. As such, Shriners International simply is not knowledgeable of all historic or current controversies or debates in each member country regarding the proper display of flags or images that reasonably can be construed as a reference to a flag. As a result and to maintain the Principles of the Order and Ethics as stated in the bylaws of Shriners International, it is believed that it is in the best interests of the Order and the Nobility that only the


following flags be displayed by a Noble (in his capacity as a member of Shriners International) or by a Club, Unit, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant organizations of Shriners International: a national or state flag as a "state" is defined in

§101.3(n) of the bylaws of Shriners International, a temple flag as defined in Article 21 of the bylaws of Shriners International or the Imperial Potentate's flag.

The display of any other flag or image that reasonably can be construed as a reference to any other flag by a Noble (in his capacity as a member of Shriners International) or by a Club, Unit, organization of Nobles or affiliated or appendant organizations of Shriners International is prohibited without the written permission of the Imperial Potentate.

t was brought to my attention this past week that more than a few Shrine Nobles do not really know or understand the aspects of our International Shrine Clown Association Sneaker Fund; what it does, how are donations to the Sneaker Fund utilized, or how it came about.

Initially, let's reflect back to how the start of the ISCA Sneaker Fund began. A group of Shrine Clowns, in speaking with doctors at our Shrine Burn

Hospitals, were advised that there was a need for a comfortable, well fitting, static free

shoe with a non-slip sole for our burn patients. The suggestion was brought forward by the Clowns to utilize a Converse red sneaker that a number of

the Clowns wore. So started a quest throughout ISCA Clowns to raise funds to purchase sneakers for all hospital patients requiring stable footwear. This Clown fundraiser was, of course, called

The Sneaker Fund. Throughout the years, greater demands and requirements were requested of ISCA Clowns for added funding for burns research for children at our 4 Shrine Burn Hospitals for Children.

As of 2014 it was mandated by the Imperial Shrine that the Shriners Hospital for Children Canada, Montreal, Research Centre be designated as the official Research Centre for Osteogenesis Imperfecta (Brittle Bone Disease) in children. What that means is that all funds raised under the umbrella of the Canada Sneaker Fund go directly to the Shriners Hospital for Children Canada, Montreal, Research Centre to be applied to research of this debilitating disease.

I was surprised to learn that a common belief among a few Nobles is that the funds collected for the Sneaker Fund, went to support Shrine Clown Units. Further it was a belief that the ISCA Sneaker Fund Chairmen have all their expenses including travel expenses provided through the Sneaker Fund. Nothing could be further from the truth that any ISCA Shrine Clown or Clown Unit benefits financially from donations received under the Sneaker Fund.

All donations to the ISCA Sneaker Fund in Canada are directed through a Shrine Centre to the Shriners Hospital for Children Canada in Montreal and from there to the Montreal research centre.

As ISCA Clowns our rewards are far greater than a monetary value, it's a pride in knowing funds raised through our hard work clowning that benefits our children. All expenses and travel expenses incurred by an ISCA Executive and Sneaker Chairman are at his own expense.

No greater a reward can a clown receive than a child's smile, a hug and a "Thank You".

The next time you meet one of our hard working Clowns at an event, remember he's probably working the Sneaker for our Shrine Kids.

He is currently serving his 11th year as a member of the Board of Directors for Shriners International and Shriners Hospitals for Children.

The experience of both growing up in a small town and being a long-time resident of Houston, the largest city in the southern U.S., and Texas, has given Gantt the ability to adjust to surroundings and situations, and be comfortable and confident wherever he is. This adaptability will help him effectively guide and lead our two organizations, given their worldwide presence.

Years of Service

Gantt was raised a Master Mason at Cherryville Lodge #505 in 1971. He is a member of the York Rite, Grotto and was honored with the 33rd Degree of the Scottish Rite. He became a member of Oasis Shriners in Charlotte, N.C., in 1972, and joined Arabia Shriners in Houston in 1980, where he held numerous offices, including chairman of the Fiveyear Planning Committee. He served as the temple's Potentate in 2002.

Gantt is a chairman emeritus of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Houston Board of Governors and has served at the Imperial level as Outer Guard Aide, Captain of the Guard Aide, Imperial Marshal Aide and member of the Imperial Dispensations and Charters Committee. During his years as a member of the Boards of Directors, he has served on a number of committees, including Budget, Building and Equipment, Information Systems, Public Relations, Salary, Personnel and Retirement, Planning, Corporate Compliance, Education Seminars, Sports, Research, Medical Affairs, Strategic Planning, Investments and Budget. In addition, he has served as Liaison Officer to the Shriners Hospitals for Children in Philadelphia. Houston, Cincinnati, Montreal, Tampa, Honolulu and Galveston. In addition to his service in the Shriners fraternity, Gantt is an honorary member of the DeMolay Legion of Honor.

Personal Details and Perspectives

Born in Gastonia, N.C., Gantt attended Wingate College in Wingate, N.C. He then joined the United States Marine Corps., where he served as an air traffic controller. He is now President of Piedmont Contractors, Inc., a commercial general contracting firm in Houston.

At home, Gantt and his wife, Lisa, enjoy NASCAR and the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, where they are life-members and Gantt is an active committee member.

As Imperial Potentate, Gantt hopes to strengthen the relationship between headquarters' staff, the Boards of Governors, the national Joint Boards and the temple Divans. "We need to do some teambuilding, and remember we are all on the same team," he said.

To Gantt, his efforts on behalf of the fraternity and philanthropy are part of a much larger picture.

"Collectively – as Shriners – we make a difference in the lives of children every day – a much bigger difference than we could make individually," said Gantt.

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Shrine Parade Regulations

- 1. Non-Shriners. Other than the police escort, dignitaries, distinguished guests and Shriners Hospitals for Children patients, only Shriners are permitted in Shrine parades.
- 2. Cadence. Marching cadence will be 110 steps to the minute, except for specialized units which may require a different cadence.
- 3. Interval. Intervals of not over 80 feet between temples and 40 feet between units are to be constantly maintained.
- 4. No Impersonations. No impersonations of ethnic groups, females, or political figures are allowed in parades.
 - 5. Vehicle Equipment. No motorized vehicles shall engage their emergency sirens or lights.
- 6. Safety Laws. Motorcycles, scooters, and other motorized vehicles shall obey local laws regarding speed, prudent operation and the use of hard helmets. In states where helmets are not required, the temple potentate may direct helmet use for safety reasons instead of fezzes.
- 7. Throwing Objects. No objects shall be THROWN to spectators along the parade route. A Shriner may walk along the edge of a parade route and hand out Shrine information or other appropriate objects. [No latex balloons.]
- 8. Demeaning Displays. No demeaning displays, or discharge of firearms of any type, or other items that may be considered in poor taste are permitted.
- Alcoholic Beverages. Members of participating units shall not drink any alcoholic beverages before or during any parade, and they shall be circumspect in the use of soft drinks in public places so as not to give the impression they are drinking alcoholic beverages.
 - 10. Reviewing Stand.
- (a) At Imperial Session parades, a reviewing stand is reserved for the exclusive use of the Imperial Potentate, Imperial officers, Past Imperial officers and such guests as invited by the Imperial Potentate.
- (b) At the reviewing stand during Imperial parades, temple divans will give the hand salute and must not stop to salaam. The Imperial Potentate (or ranking Imperial officer) receives the salute. When temples from an Imperial Officer's state or province pass in review, that officer receives the salute of these temples along with the Imperial Potentate.
- (c) At association of temples parades, the ranking Imperial officer along with the association president or potentate (as appropriate) receives the salute of all temples. Other Imperial officers and association officers will follow the same procedure as above.
- (d) At association of temples parades, the temple potentates may leave their cars and accept the salutes of their units.
- 11. "Country" Flags. No "country" flag shall be lowered or dipped when passing the Reviewing Stand or elsewhere.
- 12. Enforcement. Parade marshals shall enforce all Shrine parade regulations and they shall report any violator to the potentate of his temple. Failure on the part of a temple potentate to cooperate with parade marshals shall be reported in writing to the Imperial Potentate.
- 13. Potentate Responsibility. Each Potentate is personally responsible and accountable for knowingly permitting any violation of parade regulations. Temple Potentates are required to review parade regulations with their temple marshal, the Parade Marshal, and their unit heads.

CIVIC PARADES

- Shriners Only. Notwithstanding the provisions in §335.11 of the international bylaws, in parades of temples at annual sessions of Shriners International, or in local Shriners parades or exhibitions under the auspices of temples or Shrine associations, only Nobles shall participate.
- 2. Civic Parades. In civic parades, and non-Shrine public appearances, Nobles, their ladies and children, and Masonic related or sponsored organizations, may participate, with the approval of the Potentate. Only Nobles may perform, compete, ride vehicles with fewer than four wheels, or operate any vehicle while parading.
- 3. Regulations. Shrine Parade Regulations 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11 and 13 apply to civic parades as well.
